Staghorn Chapel History

Jack Holder opened Staghorn Chapel to visitors on Easter Sunday, April 20, 2003 with a sunrise service. Jack created it to be a "private place to give thanks to God."

Staghorn Chapel 335 and Waterford Cove

The idea of Staghorn Chapel began in 1999 and Jack found a builder from Nicholson who was enthusiastic about constructing Jacks "haven of rest." It was **Walter Barnett** who shared the vision and as the general contractor followed the project from its initial grading through to the final completion of handicap parking.

In finalizing the design for the structure and surrounding space, Jack wanted a 30 feet x 40 feet courtyard that had access to the knave and sanctuary when the double doors are opened. The design has worked well for weddings, christenings, sunrise services, and Christmas events.

Staghorn Chapel has been the site of hundreds of special events and a significant number of those events have been weddings. Some weddings have been followed by a reception at the Staghorn Recreation Center open to Staghorn residents who have paid their dues. Reserving the Chapel is discussed below.

Manufacturing, was responsible for the
purchase and installation of the black
walnut wood used throughout the chapel
Interior. Much of the design is similar to
that found in Providence United Methodist
Church, Charlotte, NC.

The beautiful trinity windows shown here were salvaged from the First Presbyterian Church of Charlotte, North Carolina.

The alter was created by **Doug Tippens** and **Carlos Solares. It** is made of black walnut and measures 52 inches long, 18 inches wide, and 64 inches high. A marble ledge was also created on top to hold candles.

While in Rome in 2001, a crucifix was purchased that was blessed by Vatican priests and now hangs in Staghorn Chapel for visitors of the Catholic faith.

A stained-glass window with a Jewish Star of David also graces the chapel. The chandelier is of French Napoleonic design.

While in Italy, Jack's family visited the town of Amalfi, known for its handmade paper products. There Jack purchased the guest registration book made of fine paper.
